The smoothness of the needle's movement can lead to less skin trauma, which is a significant advantage. A fellow artist I know transitioned to a rotary machine and noted a marked improvement in client comfort during longer sessions.

Pneumatic Machines

This technology allows for a lightweight design and reduces the vibration that can be felt with traditional machines. While they may not be as widely used yet, they offer a unique alternative for artists looking for a different experience. I recently met a tattooist who had switched to a pneumatic machine and was enthusiastic about the reduced strain on his wrist during extended work hours.
